ATTICA WINS BEST LIST

In a year in which the Australian hospitality industry was tested to the limit, the 2020 **Australia's Wine List of the Year Awards**, announced online on Monday 30 November, have highlighted the depth of talent and dedication of many sommeliers around the country.

No restaurant has done more to maintain the highest standards in wine and wine list creativity than the winner of this year's Australia's Wine List of the Year, Melbourne's acclaimed **Attica** restaurant.

A regular on the rollcall of the World's Best 50 Restaurants, Attica celebrates boundary-pushing cuisine. Likewise, its wine list is daring and challenging while keeping the closest eye on quality. Attica sommeliers **Dom Robinson** and **Jane Lopes** are joint winners of the Judy Hirst Award as the sommeliers responsible for the winning List. Ms Lopes returned to the US due to the COVID-19 lockdown but is recognised for her exceptional work in curating the wine list over the past three years and working with current head sommelier Dom Robinson on the winning list.

According to **Chair of Judges Peter Forrestal**, Attica has been on the judges' radar for several years as one of Australia's top wine programs. A Finalist in Wine List of the Year in 2019 - in 2020 their list - submitted before the pandemic, was chosen by the International Jury as the leading wine list in Australia. "Attica owner and chef, Ben Shewry, has worked tirelessly finding innovative ways to keep his staff working productively in the darkest days of 2020. At present they offer an experience called 'Attica In Between'. As their website says, 'it isn't necessarily the future, but it is Attica now.' While the wine list won't be operating as it did when it was judged, we understand Attica's customers will again be able to enjoy an outstanding wine offer true to the Attica philosophy," Forrestal said.

Attica also takes out Best City Restaurant List, Best Victorian List and Best Non-Alcoholic List.

Ironically given the long lockdowns in Melbourne, three of six finalists considered for the major award - **Attica, Cutler & Co.** and **Masani** - are all Melbourne based.

Awards Founder Rob Hirst said it was cruel that in a year when Australia's wine lists achieved the **highest ever average level in the 27-year history of the Awards** (2.2 Glasses) that COVID-19 should hit the industry. "157 outlets achieved the prestigious 3 Glass level (Outstanding) compared with 9 in 1994."

"Obviously, a number of lists will be different today to what was submitted for judging earlier in the year. I'm sure the public will understand and join us in celebrating the extraordinary passion and commitment of sommeliers and business owners who have achieved glass rating and award success in these 2020 Awards. This is recognition that is theirs forever" Hirst added.

Forrestal believes that ongoing education and training is at the heart of this ever-growing professionalism. "Across the board, 2020 lists were better organised and presented. The best lists reflect the personalities of those involved while illustrating just how seriously sommeliers view the accessibility of the lists to their customers".

"Also, in a year when Victoria has suffered so much at the hand of the pandemic, it is delightful to report the regional success for the **Mornington Peninsula** that glitters with more great and imaginative lists than ever before. Other regional stars include **Harbourside Bar & Kitchen, Cairns** in Far North Queensland, while **Charred Kitchen in Orange,** as a finalist in five of our awards, showed that its country location has little influence on quality."

Bennelong pays tribute to its iconic location with an All-Australian list of incomparable quality, while the elegant space occupied by **Reign in the Queen Victoria Building**, is matched by the veuve and panache of its bubblies. Taken all in all, this is a celebration of the hospitality industry and those who work in it," Forrestal said.

The judging panel of 34 respected Australian and international judges includes Master Sommeliers, Masters of Wine, wine judges, educators, wine media and previous award winners. "It is the nature and calibre of these independent judges as well as their global recognition and the respect in which they are held that sets these awards apart," acknowledged Hirst.

The most popular award category this year remained **Best Wine by the Glass**, with preservation technology such as Coravin making this a perfect vehicle for offering premium wines to consumers. This was followed again by **Best Matching of Food and Wine** – reflecting the ever-closer liaison between sommeliers and chefs. Showing both consumer interest and sommelier desire to showcase the beauty of Australian wines, **Best Listing of Australian Wines** and **Best Listing of a Region's Wines** were also areas with a lot of strength in 2020 wine lists.
